

If these colours do not correspond with the terminal identifications of your plug, connect as follows: Blue wire to terminal coded N (Neutral) or coloured Black.

Brown wire to terminal coded L (Live) or coloured Red.

If in doubt — consult a competent electrician.

We recommend that you should disconnect the AC cord from the outlet.

Copyright laws

Your attention is drawn to the fact that recording of pre-recorded tapes or discs or other published or broadcast material may infringe copyright laws.

Cautions

Please read these cautions before operating the S-VHS-C Camcorder, so that you will obtain the best results from your Camcorder.

Video head clogging:

The video heads are the means by which the S-VHS-C Camcorder places picture signals on the tape during recording, and reads picture signals from the tape during playback. If these heads become dirty and clogged from long use, the signals can no longer be recorded correctly, and the playback picture will be distorted accordingly. This is the case, for example, during the playback of a tape, the sound of which is reproduced normally, but no picture is seen, or the picture is greatly distorted. When such symptoms occur, have the S-VHS-C Camcorder checked by qualified service personnel.

If condensation forms inside the S-VHS-C Camcorder:

Condensation (dew) forms when warm air comes in contact with a cold object, for example on a window in a heated room in winter. Condensation may form in the S-VHS-C Camcorder and damage the tape and the video heads, if:

- The S-VHS-C Camcorder is in a room where the heater has just been turned on.
- The S-VHS-C Camcorder is in a room with steam or high humidity.
- The S-VHS-C Camcorder is brought from cold surroundings into a well-heated room.
- The S-VHS-C Camcorder is suddenly brought from cool surroundings, such as an air-conditioned room or car, to a place which is hot and humid.
- When condensation has formed inside the S-VHS-C Camcorder, the "DEW" indication in the electronic viewfinder (EVF) will flash and a few seconds later, the unit will turn itself off to protect the tape and the video heads.

After a while, turn the unit on again and make sure that the Dew mark is not displayed any more. Then, wait about 1 hour before operating the S-VHS-C Camcorder again. Depending on the surrounding conditions, it may take several hours before the S-VHS-C Camcorder can be used again.

- As condensation forms gradually, it may take about 10 — 15 minutes before the S-VHS-C Camcorder turns itself off after a change of working environment.
- In an extremely cold place, condensation may freeze and turn into frost. In this case, it may take quite some time for the frost to melt, turn into dew and evaporate.
- When you bring the S-VHS-C Camcorder from a very cold place, e.g. the ski slopes, into a heated room, keep it in a tightly closed plastic bag or similar to prevent condensation from forming inside the S-VHS-C Camcorder.

Keep the S-VHS-C Camcorder away from only smoke and steam.

Protect the S-VHS-C Camcorder from humidity and dust.

Surrounding conditions:

Use the S-VHS-C Camcorder under conditions where the temperatures are between 0°C and 40°C and where the humidity is between 20% and 80%. To avoid deformation of the outer case or other damaged, do not leave it exposed to direct sunlight for any length of time, also never leave it in a closed automobile.

Keep the S-VHS-C Camcorder away from heaters.

Keep the S-VHS-C Camcorder away from TV sets: Do not place the S-VHS-C Camcorder near a TV set because it might impair the picture and sound quality of the recorded tape, and/or adversely. Affect the performance of the S-VHS-C Camcorder.

Keep magnets away:

Never bring a magnet or magnetized object such as fluorescent lamps, motors, electric clocks and battery operated toys etc. close to the S-VHS-C Camcorder because this could adversely affect its performance.

Keep the S-VHS-C Camcorder away from areas with strong electric fields:

The picture may become distorted, when the S-VHS-C Camcorder is used in places with strong electric fields, such as near TV or radio antennas.

Never put any object inside:

Never insert any object other than a video cassette into the S-VHS-C Camcorder. If any object is dropped into it or if any liquid is spilled into it, consult qualified service personnel. Operating it with some foreign matter inside may cause fire or electric shock.

No fingers inside:

Touching internal parts of the S-VHS-C Camcorder is dangerous and may cause serious damage to the S-VHS-C Camcorder. Do not attempt to disassemble it. For internal inspection, adjustment or repairs, consult qualified service personnel.

Handle with care:

Never drop the S-VHS-C Camcorder or expose it to strong physical shocks. Shocks during use may result in abnormal operation and performance.

Appearance of smear distortion:

Smear distortion is a peculiar characteristic of the CCD device. It appears as a bright vertical stripe on the screen when the S-VHS-C Camcorder is aimed at spot lights or other bright lights and light reflecting objects. To avoid this problem, make sure not to aim the S-VHS-C Camcorder at such strong light sources during shooting.

Cover the lens with the cap after shooting.

Keep the S-VHS-C Camcorder away from strong light: Do not expose the S-VHS-C Camcorder to strong light, because the heat from it may cause deformation or other damage.

When the S-VHS-C Camcorder is not being used: Remove the video cassette and turn the S-VHS-C Camcorder off with the POWER switch.

Keep insecticide spray away:


Never spray things like insecticide on the lens and body of the S-VHS-C Camcorder. Also, never leave rubber or vinyl objects in contact with any part of it for a long time, because the colour might change and the body surface might be damaged.

Never place the S-VHS-C Camcorder with the cassette compartment side facing down:


Never use the S-VHS-C Camcorder with the cassette compartment facing down as this might cause uneven winding and slacking of the tape.

Cleaning the S-VHS-C Camcorder:


- The body of the S-VHS-C Camcorder is made of plastic materials. Never use benzine, thinner or other chemicals for cleaning, because the colour might be changed and the case surface might be damaged.
- Wipe the case and operation panel with a soft, clean cloth. For persistent stains, use a cloth moistened with mild detergent and water, and then wipe with a dry cloth.
- Clean the lens only with a blower brush (used for photo cameras) or a special lens cleaning tissue (used for glasses and cameras).





Inserting the battery pack (SBC5217)




- Align the grooves of the left side of the battery pack and the Camcorder.
- **9** Push the battery pack until it locks with a click.

Removing the battery pack (SBC5217)



- Slide the battery eject lever to remove the battery.
- Pull out the battery pack.

AC adaptor (SBC5420)




- 1 Connect the DC input cable from the DC output socket on the AC adaptor to the DC input socket on the Camcorder.

Note:

When a battery pack is attached on the AC adaptor, the Camcorder cannot be supplied with power.

Car battery cord (SBC5422)




- Start the engine and insert the car battery cord into the cigarette lighter socket.
- 2 Connect the other end to the DC input socket on the Camcorder.

Notes:

- The car battery cord can only be used with 12V DC negative-grounded vehicles.
- Do not start the car engine while the Camcorder is powered by the car battery.

Charging the battery pack



- 1 Align the grooves of the battery pack and the AC adaptor.
- Push in the battery pack until it locks with a click.
- Connect to the mains.

Charging indicator: Lights while charging is taking

place and goes off when charging

is completed.

Charging time : Approx. 60 minutes.

Note:

The charging time differs depending on the ambient temperature and the condition of the battery pack.

Recording time for the Camcorder : Approx. 50 minutes.

Note:

The recording time per charge is influenced by the duration of recording standby, frequency of zooming, etc.


Refreshing function

The battery pack can be recharged for repeated use. However, if it is recharged repeatedly while there is still some charge left, its charging capacity will be gradually reduced. Therefore, if you often need to recharge semi-discharged battery packs, attach the battery pack to the AC adaptor, connect the AC adaptor to the mains, and press the refresh button to completely discharge the battery pack. (The refresh lamp will light up, and when the discharging is finished, the charging indicator lamp will light up instead.) This will increase the charging capacity and extend the operating life of the battery pack. Therefore, if the operating life of the battery pack becomes noticeably shorter, refresh it. (It is recommended to refresh the battery pack approx, once every five recharging.)

Electronic viewfinder (EVF)


For low-angle shots

The electronic viewfinder (EVF) can be turned upward and forward by a maximum of 180°. This is convenient for taking low-angle shots.




Eyepiece corrector

This control makes it possible for people who wear glasses to adjust the eyepiece to their eyesight.




For viewing the EVF with the left eye


- Turn the eyecup counterclockwise to remove it.
- Turn the eyecup so that its longer side faces left. Align the marks, and insert and turn the eyecup clockwise until it locks with a click.



How to Insert the battery for the clock operation



Remove the lid.



Insert the "CR2032" size battery with polarities (+ and -) aligned correctly and then replace the lid.


Notes:

- This battery is necessary for the date and the time, title, S-VHS-C and white balance modes to be memorized by the Camcorder.
- If the battery is not inserted or if it is exhausted, the indication "BACKUP" in the electronic viewfinder (EVF) will flash for approximately 10 seconds when turning the Camcorder on.
- When replacing the battery while the time and the date indications are still correct, connect the Camcorder to the AC adaptor for the duration of the battery replacement so that the time will remain unchanged.

CAUTIONS FOR BATTERY REPLACEMENT

- The life of the battery is about one year. Inspect and if necessary, replace the battery once a year.
- Load the new battery with its polarities (+ and -) aligned correctly.
- Remove spent battery immediately and dispose of it.
- Do not try to short-circuit, recharge or heat the battery and do not throw it into a fire.

Setting of the date and time



1 Push the DATE/TIME selector button. The indication shown below will appear in the electronic viewfinder (EVF).


- If no battery is inserted, the indication "BACKUP" will light up.
- When the SHIFT button is kept pressed for more than about 2 seconds, the "Year" portion will start to flash. Then, at every press of the SHIFT button, the items to be set will flash in the following sequence.
 - \rightarrow Year \rightarrow Month \rightarrow Date \rightarrow Hour \rightarrow Minute \rightarrow Year \rightarrow

When the SET button is pushed, the flashing portion displayed will be changed in the following sequence.


- Repeat procedures 2 and 3 until all items have been set.
- Once the time and date are set, press the SHIFT button in response to a precise time signal so that the clock may begin to function.

When the DATE/TIME selector is pushed repeatedly, the indications will change in the following sequence.

Operation modes and usable functions

When the Operation select switch is set to the "AUTO-LOCK" or "AUTO", the controls and functions marked with "X" cannot be operated. When using this Camcorder for the first time, use it with the Operation select switch set to the "AUTO-LOCK" or "AUTO".

- When starting to shoot in a hurry, setting to either of these positions will prevent mistaken operations.
- This switch has nothing to do with operation modes other than those connected with shooting.



Focus

Continuous auto focus






Notes:

In the following shooting conditions, the Auto focus system will not be able to provide stable and exact focus adjustment. Set the Focus mode selector to "MANUAL" in such cases and adjust the focus by turning the manual focus control.

- 1. When shooting a subject through dirty glass.
- 2. When shooting subjects with shiny surfaces. (The focusing zone frame may disappear.)
- 3. When shooting a subject with a part of it near and another part far from the S-VHS-C Camcorder.
- 4. When shooting an oblique subject.
- 5. When shooting a subject with distinct horizontal stripes.
- 6. When shooting a flat subject such as a white wall.
- 7. When no part of the subject is within the focusing zone frame.


When pressing the "W" zoom button to zoom to wide-angle, it is possible to focus on objects that are more than 5 mm away from the front lens surface. When zooming to wide-angle, you have only to approach the objects and shoot them.





Recording titles

The titling function makes it possible to input several titles into memory and recall them later during shooting at the push of a button for superimposition onto the normal picture (Digital title memory function).

Inputting a title into memory

This operation can be performed while the Camcorder is in the recording pause or stop mode.




- 1 Use the macro function to adjust the focus when shooting a small written, printed or painted title.
- Press the MEMORY button.
 - Keep the button pressed for more than half a second.
 - The title is memorized.

Note:

Use S-VHS-C/VHS-C video cassettes only.

Notes:

- Recording onto prerecorded tapes automatically erases the previously recorded video and audio signals.
- An inverted cassette cannot be inserted.
- Do not load and unload the cassette repeatedly without allowing the tape to run at all. This will slacken the tape and thereby damage it.
- The cassette is equipped with a safety tab to prevent accidental erasure. When the tab is removed, recording is impossible. If you wish to record on a cassette whose tab has been removed, use adhesive tape to reseal the slot.
- To avoid excessive exposure to dust and fingerprints, do not open the front tape cover.




Storage of cassettes

- Avoid exposing the cassettes to direct sunlight.
 Keep them away from heaters.
- Avoid storing the cassettes in humid or dusty places.
- Do not drop the cassettes. Do not expose them to violent vibrations or shocks.
- Do not expose the cassettes to strong magnetic fields (near a motor, transformer or magnet).
- Place the cassettes in cassette cases and position them vertically.

During recording, playback, insert editing, and audio dubbing, the remaining tape time is indicated in minutes. When the remaining tape time becomes less than 2 minutes, the indication will flash.

TAPE SELECT button

When using cassette tapes with long recording time (45 minutes in the SP mode, 90 minutes in LP mode), press the TAPE SELECT button so that the cassette indication "T-45" appears. When the cassette is ejected, the indication will change to "T-30".

VITC signals

This Camcorder is designed for recording VITC signals (Vertical Interval Time Code) from a VITC generator which can be mounted on top of the Camcorder. Using VITC editing controller system (optional), cassette tapes that have been recorded with VITC signals can be edited conveniently and frame-by-frame precision.







Resetting the time code to zero

- When a new cassette tape is inserted into the Camcorder, the RESET key should be pressed. This resets the time code value to zero. If the time code is not reset, the VITC generator will continue counting up to a maximum of 24 hours. The time code then automatically starts from zero—perhaps in the middle of a cassette tape.
- An internal battery ensures that the last time code value before the recording was interrupted is always retained in memory. Thus when camera recording is resumed later, the time code sequence continues from the point where it was halted, even if the Camcorder was switched off or the VITC generator was disconnected from the Camcorder in the meantime.

Indicator lamps

- The green indicator lamp "GEN" is lit while the time code is being recorded together with the video signal.
- The red indicator lamp "BATT" lights up when the battery is nearly exhausted.



Cautions for making camera recordings with VITC signals

To ensure that the desired scenes can be found during editing, the time code must be recorded continuously without gaps.

- Provide a leader for each video cassette. Leave the lens cover on the camera lens and start recording with the VITC generator connected. Let the Camcorder run like this for at least 20 seconds.
- Each time you start the Camcorder, small jumps may appear in the timecode. These jumps would make editing of the first frames of a scene difficult. Thus get into the habit of always starting the camera 5 seconds before the actions you wish to record actually start.
- Do not wind the tape in the video cassette forwards or backwards after taking a shot. The successive shots must be recorded in continuous sequence.
- Do not use the Camera search or Rec review function.
- 5. Never make new recordings over parts of a recorded original cassette.

Battery replacement

The battery in the VITC generator has a life expectancy of 5 to 7 years.

If the red indicator lamp "BATT" lights up, there is still enough battery power to continue the timecode recording until the end of the inserted video cassette. However, before starting to record on the next cassette, have your video dealer insert a new battery.

S-VHS format



This format ensures high resolution and high picture quality by using high performance S-VHS-C video cassette tapes.

For recording

A : Auto position

- On S-VHS-C cassettes, recordings will automatically be made in the S-VHS format.
- On VHS-C cassettes, recordings will automatically be made in the VHS format.

OFF: For recording in the conventional VHS format on an S-VHS-C cassette.

When using VHS-C cassettes, the recording is made in the VHS format irrespective of the selected recording format.

For playback

It is not necessary to select the format.

Note:

If a cassette recorded in S-VHS is played back on a conventional VHS Camcorder or VCR, it is not possible to obtain a playback picture.

Hi-Fi (Stereo) sound

Stereo sound can be recorded on the Hi-Fi audio track via the built-in stereo microphone. At the same time, mono sound is recorded on the normal sound track, making it possible for a tape recorded on this Camcorder to be played back on a mono-type Camcorder or VCR.

Index signal (VISS)

The recording of index signals at the beginning of and during recordings makes possible the use of the VHS index search or the intro scan function when playing back the tape on a VCR equipped with these functions.

An index signal is recorded when one of the following operations is performed.

- When recording is started for the first time after the Camcorder is turned on.
- When recording is restarted after the cassette is exchanged or the tape is played back.

In each of these cases, the "INDEX" indication will flash for a few seconds in the electronic viewfinder (EVF).

 When recording index signals, space the signals at least 5 minutes in the LP mode and 2 minutes in the SP mode.

Supplemental information

What is "colour temperature"?

Light is composed of various colour components in different proportions. A relationship exists between the temperature of a light source and the colour components of the emitted light; as the temperature rises, the colour of the light varies from red, orange, yellow, white to blue in that order. "Colour temperature" is a value that expresses differences in colour among light sources, measured in Kelvin. Bluish light has higher colour temperature than reddish light.

What is "white balance"?

Making the colours look natural on TV is what white balance is all about. Because a camera is not as adaptable as the human eye, if a light source is reddish, white subjects in that light are recorded as reddish. White balance adjustment is performed to compensate for colour temperature variations of light so that whites are reproduced as white. Correct white balance makes all other colours correct. The Camcorder can perform automatic white balance adjustment in the full-auto mode. However, if illumination is insufficient, white balance adjustment cannot be performed. To obtain correct colours, therefore, sufficient illumination is essential.

What is "illuminance"?

"Illuminance" (also called 'luminance') is the intensity or brightness of reflected light, expressed in lux. The Camcorder is designed to provide best pictures under the conditions of a 700-lux illuminance, although shooting is possible all the way down to 9 lux. To obtain good pictures in very bright light, the use of an ND (neutral density) filter is recommended. (See chart on the right.)

How to get good colour pictures

The simplest way is to provide sufficient lighting (close to the camera's reference illuminance) and accurately adjust the camera to the colour temperature of that lighting. If light sources of different colour temperatures are used together, accurate white balance adjustment is very difficult. For example, if natural light is mixed with artificial light, which is likely to occur next to windows, correct colours of the subject are difficult to obtain. It is recommended in such cases that curtains in the room be closed to shut out light from outside. Also, when artificial lighting devices are used, they should all have the same colour temperature. For example, it is recommended that incandescent or halogen lamps not be used together with fluorescent lighting.
